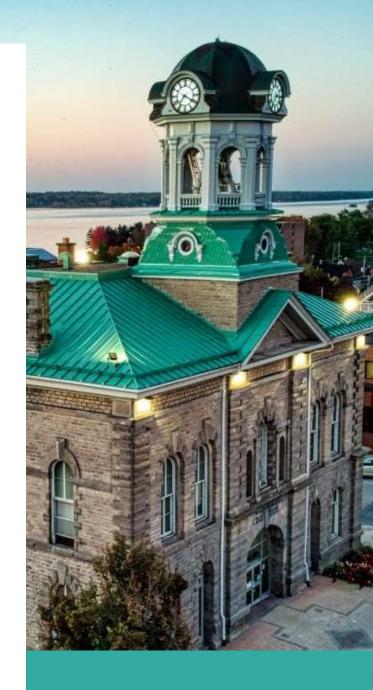

# 2023 Capital Budget

As part of the annual budget process Council reviews, deliberates and approves the capital budget. The capital budget funds investments in infrastructure such as roads, storm sewers, facilities, and parks. This includes asset replacement as well as some asset maintenance.

The capital budget is developed by staff and based upon Council approved service levels and priorities. In preparing the capital budget staff reviews the status of outstanding capital projects to ensure that workplans can accommodate new projects. In the prioritization of projects for the new budget year, projects are discussed by senior staff as part of a comprehensive internal review of the capital budget.

#### **Project Prioritization**

When prioritizing projects, the following criteria is considered:

- Service levels staff's review considers the service levels that have been approved by Council and what is required to maintain them.
- Condition Assessments Condition assessments are completed on assets to determine rehabilitation needs and ultimately the replacement of the asset. The condition of the asset is important to maintaining service levels. Service levels are also considered in the City's asset management plan.
- Health & Safety Staff must consider health and safety for both staff and the public to minimize both the risk of injury and the risk of litigation.
- Regulatory Requirements The City has many regulations to follow such as O. Reg. 239/02: Minimum Maintenance Standards for Municipal Highways.

# **Project Costing**

Staff work diligently to get the most value for taxpayers' dollars. The City's procurement policy ensures that efficiency and low costs are always considered. It also ensures that all goods and services are acquired in a competitive, fair, and open manner and that the process is effective and accountable. Across the board contingencies are not added to projected project costs. Staff work hard to balance current year quotes with anticipated subsequent years prices and strive to maximize every dollar spent. Staff also discuss certain projects with other municipalities to learn from their experiences and avoid unforeseen costs where possible.

# **Asset Management Plan (AMP)**

O. Reg. 588/17, Asset Management Planning for Municipal Infrastructure, requires all municipalities to have an updated asset management plan. The regulation helps municipalities better understand what important services need to be supported over the long term, while identifying infrastructure challenges and opportunities, and finding innovative solutions. The key components of the asset management plan are:

- Infrastructure Asset Inventory
- Levels of Service
- Lifecycle Management and Financial Strategy

The City's asset management plan was last updated in 2016 and was required to be updated in 2022. The AMP will be updated in 2023. The AMP is required for grant applications and is intended to be the basis for capital budgets. The AMP is also an important tool when developing a long-term financial plan.

## **Ten-Year Capital Plan**

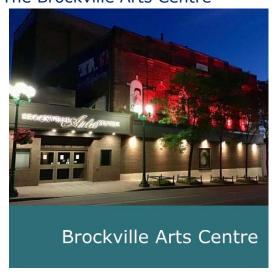
Once the AMP is updated, a 10-year capital plan will be developed during 2023 and will be reported to Council prior to the start of the 2024 budget. Tied to the AMP, the 10-year capital plan can provide short- and long-term capital and financial requirements.

The following are the proposed capital projects for 2023. There has been an extensive internal review of the 2023 capital plan.

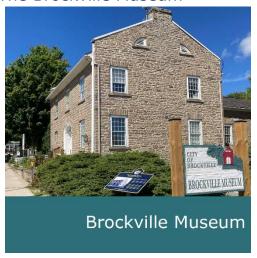

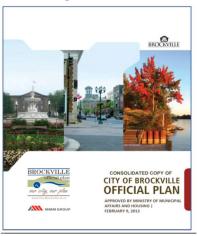

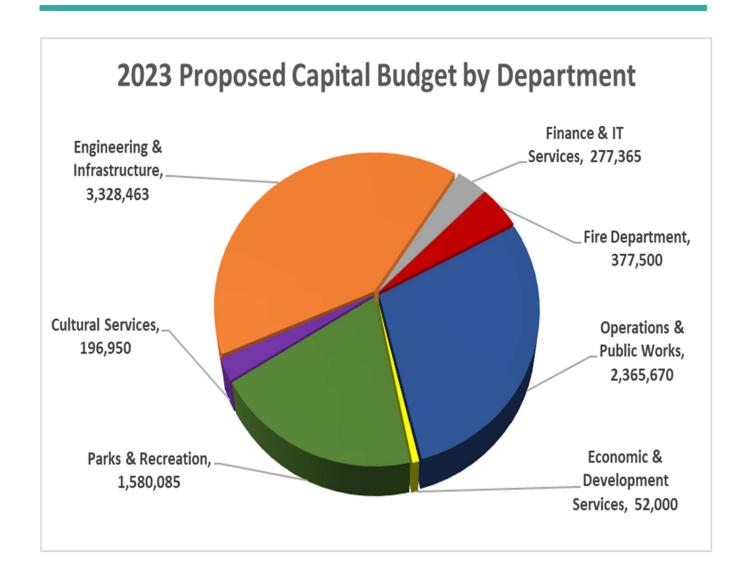

# **Funding**

# Funding by Department

The total proposed capital budget for 2023 is \$8,178,033, which is down 6.6% from 2022 capital budget of \$8,873,842. The following graph shows the breakdown of the capital budget by department. The highest amount, \$3.3 million, is applied to the Engineering and Infrastructure Department, which includes road projects. The least amount supporting the Economic and Development Services Department of \$52,000.



# Funding by Revenue Source

During the budget process staff review the total amount of cost for each project, as well as in the aggregate. Each project is reviewed and identified for grant eligibility. The level of reserves as well as grant funding opportunities are considered to maximize how taxpayer's dollars are spent. Though the 2023 capital budget is overall lower than the 2022 capital budget, the amount that will be attributed to the tax levy has increased.

# Tax Levy

The amount on the tax levy is \$2.5 million, or 30.98% of the total capital budget, (2022 \$872,829 or 9.96%).

Canada Community Building Fund (CCBF)

The amount that will be funded by CCBF is \$2.5 million or 30.86%, (2022 \$2.3 million or 27.28%). With the allocation of these projects, the expected balance of the CCBF fund at the end of 2023 would be \$135,634.

# Ontario Community Infrastructure Fund (OCIF)

The amount that will be funded by the OCIF fund for 2023 is \$1.2 million or 15.76%, (2022 \$1 million or 11.64%). The expected balance of the OCIF fund at the end of 2023 is expected to be \$311,400.

#### Debt

The amount that is proposed to be funded by debt is \$1.4 million or 17.88%, (2022 \$2.6 million or 30.36%).

#### Reserves

The amount that is proposed to be funded by reserves is \$25,551 or 0.31%, (2022 \$1.6 million or 18.65%). The main usage of reserves in 2022 was attributed to the arena design of \$1.2 million.
